## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Applying a Biblical Worldview in our Cultural Moment will analyze current cultural issues through the lens of Scripture. Understand how a biblical worldview addresses life's foundational questions of origin, identity, purpose, morality and destiny. Increase your confidence in discussing cultural issues, including the sanctity of life, gender ideology and postmodernism, and connect them to the grand biblical story of creation, fall, redemption and restoration.

WSBM 531 - Applying a Biblical Worldview in our Cultural Moment is an elective course at WSBM.

### COURSE OBJECTIVES

The course equips students to:

- Describe what a worldview is and how a biblical worldview gives defensible answers to life's foundational questions of origin, identity, purpose, morality and destiny
- Articulate how the core biblical narrative of creation, fall, redemption and restoration helps Christians to live out their faith with confidence in our cultural moment
- Apply a biblical worldview to cultural issues such as the sanctity of life, gender ideology and social justice, engaging in conversations in a curious, respectful and Scripturally grounded manner
- Identify non-biblical worldviews by analyzing current cultural narratives such as expressive individualism, critical theory, postmodernism and progressive Christianity

### STUDENT ASSIGNMENTS

### 1. Book Assignments (20%)

### a. Pre-Class Assignment (5%)

Read the Foreword and Chapter One of Carl Trueman's *Strange New World: How Thinkers and Activists Redefined Identity and Sparked the Sexual Revolution.* Summarize 'expressive individualism' (one paragraph) and describe how your beliefs have been shaped by the world around you (two to three paragraphs).

## Due: Upload to the class site by April 24, 2025 by 9PM

### b. Book Review (15%)

Write a 500 word report on Trueman's *Strange New World: How Thinkers and Activists Redefined Identity and Sparked the Sexual Revolution.* Summarize the author's thesis and main points (approx. 200 words), and include personal responses to the book (approx. 300 words). Consider: How is this book useful/not useful? What were two key

ideas or lessons learned while reading the book? Would the student recommend this book? Why/why not? How has the material in the book most affected the student? **Due: Upload to the class site by May 8, 2025 by 9PM** 

# 2. Definitions Assignment (10%)

Submit 2-sentence definitions for these eight key cultural terms discussed during the course:

- Sexual revolution
- Critical theory
- Intersectionality
- Social justice

- Dehumanization
- Postmodernism
- Deconstruction
  - Progressive Christianity

Due: Upload to the class site by May 16, 2025 by 9PM

# 3. Formal Letter to a Member of the Legislative Assembly (25%)

Choose a cultural issue (abortion, gender identity, etc.) discussed in the course. Write a formal letter to your local MLA outlining your concerns and convictions regarding the issue. Include a potential course of action the government could take consistent with a biblical worldview. Prior to sending the letter, share your draft letter with at least four people to solicit their feedback. Document what improvements were made to your letter. Maximum length of your letter: 500 words

Maximum length for summary of revisions based on feedback; 200 words **Due: Upload to the class site by May 19, 2025 by 9PM** 

# 4. Conversation Preparation (25%)

Choose a cultural issue discussed in the course, but different from that addressed in your MLA letter Assignment #3. Prepare for a conversation about this topic. Classroom discussion, illustrative videos and role plays during the course will help prepare students for this assignment. In point form, include in your conversation preparation:

- a. Possibilities for entering into a conversation about a sensitive cultural topic
- b. Key Questions to facilitate the conversation and better understand the other person's worldview perspective
- c. Expected non-biblical perspectives that might be raised and how you could handle these
- d. Options for sharing more information about the topic from a biblical worldview or how to continue the conversation at a later time
- e. The text and references of relevant Scripture passages with some explanation of their relevance to the cultural topic
- f. Three key talking points you will want to keep remembering throughout your conversation to help you keep sharing in a kind and winsome manner

# 5. Conversational Video Project (20%)

Submit a 5-7 minute video of your role-playing a conversation with a friend, family member or work colleague about one of the issues discussed during the course. During the simulated conversation, demonstrate kindness and respect in hearing the other person's worldview perspective and curiosity through insightful questions. Strive to demonstrate authentic care, attentive listening, and courage to winsomely share Christian truth related to the cultural topic.
