We are in a long-term relationship that has gone toxic. The relationship is affecting our spiritual, mental, emotional and physical health. How long should we wait for change?

On our school campus, we are being pressured to conform to certain behaviors which we consider to be wrong. If we don't conform, our friends will exclude us.

We endure difficulty, experience pain and suffer from anxiety. Every one of us faces crises. The question is: How should we face crises? How does Jesus face His greatest crisis?

- Jesus intercedes for His disciples.
- Jesus urges His disciples to pray to the Father.
- · Jesus submits trustingly to the Father's will.
- · The Father hears Jesus' prayer and responds.
- Jesus expresses His longing for supportive friendship.

Reflection:

- · Jesus yielded His life to the Father's will. Does submitting your will to the Father's come easily or do you struggle to trust God's will for your life?
- · The Father responded to Jesus' prayer in the Garden by sending an angel to strengthen Him. In your moments of crisis, how have you seen God answering your prayers?
