A number of years ago I worked for a short time as a manager in a government service. The director I worked under sent his manager team to a seminar on managerial leadership. Our instructor talked about the idea of "authority" - the legitimate authority according to agreed contracts that managers have, and how to use it appropriately, wisely, and effectively. His career had been as a pilot in the Canadian Armed Forces and then the head of training for pilots in the CAF. He knew a bit about authority! At one point he made the statement: **Authority only matters when we disagree**.

Today's text flows out of 12:1-2 – totally surrendering into the mercy and grace in Jesus, and allowing that surrender to transform how we think about everything. Everything, including human government. Romans 13:1-7 is the most comprehensive teaching in the New Testament about how followers of Jesus are to think about and relate to human government. We might call our passage for today **Christian Citizenship 101**.

And, there is not one of us who won't have some, "but what about" questions from our passage today!

- 1. What is the "default" mode of a transformed mind when it comes to thinking about and relating to human government?
- 2. Why must that be the default mode?
- 3. What should I expect from government?
- 4. What about when I disagree with government?
- 5. How can I grow in my attitude & appropriate response to human government?

## **Reflection Questions:**

- 1. What does my thinking about human government reveal about how well I am living from a transformed mind?
- 2. Are there ways in which I have been thinking more about my "rights" than about my "development"?
- 3. Does my attitude toward government reveal that I am resting in the sovereignty of God?
