## **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This course will place our unique local church, Willingdon Church, within the context of the global church. About 1/3 of the world's population identify as Christians. In some parts of the world, the church is growing quickly. In others, it seems to be in a free-fall. There are unique theological and practical things to learn from the church in each region.

What does all this have to do with our unique, very diverse church family? We will introduce you to people from within the Willingdon Church family from each region of the world and hear powerful personal testimonies. In addition, we will explore history, theology and current faith realities within each region. Why would we do this? See below!

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

- To develop more informed "Global Christians" in the Willingdon Church family
- To celebrate and explore what God is doing in different parts of the world
- To consider what the church in each region has to offer the rest of the global church, and Willingdon Church specifically
- To get to know the Willingdon church family better, building relationships and enhancing understanding across cultures as we hear how God has been at work in the lives of our church family

## **REQUIRED READING**

Students will be required to read an assortment of articles and chapters compiled into the Course Reading Packet, available on Moodle (approximately 200 pages).

## STUDENT ASSIGNMENTS

## 1. Required Reading (35%) (5%/week)

Read the articles and chapters provided in the Course Reading Packet, available on Moodle. Reading is approximately 200 pages. For each of the seven weeks of reading, submit a 5-10 sentence reflection on what you have read.

Due: weekly reading completion and reflections due by the time class begins each week

## 2. Reflection Assignment (15%)

In approximately 500 words, explain one big idea that you have gleaned from a different part of the world as a result of taking this class and articulate some questions you think would be helpful to explore in order to understand this idea more fully. How should those of us in a Canadian church context react or respond as we are exposed to this reality?

Ideas for topics include (but are not limited to):

- Prosperity Theology
- Witchcraft, shamanism and the demonic
- Jesus showing up in dreams and visions
- Remaining faithful in the midst of suffering
- Being a Christian in a multi-religious context
- Syncretism
- Rise of Pentecostalism
- The shifting "center of gravity" of the global church
- Contextualization

## 3. Final Assignment (50%)

Pick a region of the world and explore answers to some of the questions below. Choosing around four (4) of the questions below will be sufficient for this essay length. Present your findings in an essay of 1500-2000 words.

Questions to choose from:

- What are some challenges Christians face in the region?
- What are some encouraging things God is doing in the region?
- In what ways is the church flourishing in the region?
- In what ways is the church not flourishing in the region?
- What can Christians from outside of the region learn from the Christians in the region?
- What would be some appropriate evangelistic strategies in the region?
- What are some basic statistics and demographics that give a helpful picture of life in the region?
- What can you learn by looking at the history of Christianity in this region?
- What has surprised you as you have learned about Christianity in this region?
